**MINUTES
REGULAR MEETING OF THE LAPORTE COUNTY COUNCIL
SEPTEMBER 28, 2015 AT 6:30 P.M.**

The Regular Meeting of the La Porte County Council was held on September 28, 2015 at 6:30 p.m. (local time) in the Assembly Room of the La Porte County Government Complex located at 809 State Street, La Porte, Indiana, 46350.

CALL TO ORDER

La Porte County Council President Mark Yagelski called the Meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

President Yagelski asked everyone to stand for the Pledge of Allegiance. Mr. Yagelski asked that everyone, except emergency personnel, to please turn off their cell phones at this time.

ROLL CALL

Auditor Winski took the Roll Call. Council Members present were Councilmen Bernacchi, Garner, Kirkham, Novak, Santana and Yagelski and Councilwoman Sosinski. A quorum was noted.

APPROVAL OF THE SEPTEMBER 28, 2015 AGENDA

A Motion was made by Councilwoman Sosinski and seconded by Councilman Kirkham to approve the September 28, 2015 Agenda. The Motion carried 7-0.

Auditor Winski requested that Ms. Darlene Hale make her presentation first, as she was not feeling well.

A Motion was made by Councilwoman Sosinski and seconded by Councilman Kirkham to amend the Agenda to allow Ms. Hale from IT to present first. The Motion carried 7-0.

APPROVAL OF THE AUGUST 24, 2015 REGULAR MEETING MINUTES

A Motion was made by Councilman Garner and seconded by Councilman Novak to approve the August 24, 2015 Meeting Minutes. Motion carried 6-0, with Councilwoman Sosinski abstaining, as she did not read the August 24, 2015 Meeting Minutes.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Dennis Metheny, 6757 W 450 N, Michigan City, IN 46360

Mr. Metheny reaffirmed his earlier statement that no pay raises should be given next year until the roads are repaired. He continued that he was disappointed that the County Highway Superintendent was not in attendance and that he believed that CAGIT and CEDIT taxes, put into place years ago, were supposed to be used to reduce property taxes and fix the roads. He said his assessment went up the last two years and encouraged anyone who experienced the same to contact an attorney, as he is doing. However, he strongly feels that the roads are not being attended to and being properly repaired and that it is necessary that the problem is addressed.

Rich Mrozinski, 2303 E 150 N, La Porte, IN 46350

Mr. Mrozinski thanked the Council for approving the additional appropriation for Memorial Day. Also, he wanted to comment on the County Home. He said that when he was on the County Council, he was liaison to the County Home and continues to attend meetings, as he is concerned about it. He said that there is a place in South Bend that will take the 8 residents of the County Home. He said that the Commissioners are not very forthcoming with information regarding the County Home and he does not agree that it should be given away. He also doesn't agree that the Swanson Center should be involved in the County Home and wants to insure that the employees are absorbed into other positions so the County doesn't lose them. He believes that instead of giving the County Home away with a subsidy of \$60,000, it should be appraised and possibly sold to a business or corporation.

Hearing or seeing no additional Public Comment, President Yagelski closed Public Comment.

DEPARTMENT HEAD REPORTS

Michael Bohacek, La Porte County Commissioner

Commissioner Bohacek distributed information to and addressed the Council regarding the County vehicle fleet. He said a fleet audit was conducted to find out if the vehicles are being utilized properly and if the mileage and years of service are reaching the end of life. Referencing a model from St. Joseph County, leasing versus buying was researched and it was found that it might be a very workable solution for La Porte County. Commissioner Bohacek discussed the process of leasing and said he was going to ask the Commissioners to prepare a proposal for a fleet leasing opportunity for all County vehicles.

President Yagleski asked when Commissioner Bohacek would be addressing the Council again about this issue. Commissioner Bohacek said he already had the RFP put together, so on receipt of the proposals he would, hopefully, come back in November. He added that leasing would be a cost-favorable solution and that maintenance is included and the vehicles could be made to specifications. He discussed some additional details that would be beneficial to the County and that governmental pricing would be applicable.

President Yagelski expressed concern that the Council would need information in advance of the November meeting and Commissioner Bohacek said he would get information to them as quickly as possible.

Councilman Kirkham asked if other Counties besides St. Joseph County were participating in vehicle fleet leasing. Commissioner Bohacek replied that yes, but because of the relationship with St. Joseph County,

they were easiest to approach. He also clarified that the maintenance on the vehicles could be completed by any of the local service centers such as Jiffy Lube, Valvoline and/or others.

Councilwoman Sosinski and Commissioner Bohacek discussed fuel efficiency, and Councilwoman Sosinski said she would thoroughly read the information given by Commissioner Bohacek.

Jerry Cooley, La Porte County Building Maintenance

Mr. Cooley discussed the status of current Construction projects. He also reported that part of the building's roof blew off. He also discussed the problems with the walkway and he brought a proposal for its update. He asked for guidance from the Council as to how to proceed. Councilman Garner added that, although it will cost money, this issue must be addressed.

President Yagelski asked for an update on the coating of the building. Mr. Cooley replied that instead of trying to rush to complete it this fall, it would be better to attend to it in the spring, hopefully April or May.

Andrew McGuire, La Porte County EMS Administrator

Mr. McGuire asked permission to use \$2200.00 out of the training budget to replace outdated laptops. Because it wasn't an item on the Agenda, it was discussed whether or not it should be advertised. Auditor Winski advised that when it is transferring and not an additional appropriation, it is not necessary to be advertised. Attorney Biege clarified that, although advertising it is not required, it has been a Council rule. Mr. McGuire said he could request it be added to the Agenda for the October meeting. A Motion was made by Councilman Santana and seconded by Councilwoman Sosinski to approve the item to be added to the October 26, 2015 Agenda. Motion carried 7-0.

Mike Yacullo, La Porte County Highway Engineer

Mr. Yacullo gave an update on the painting project at the Marina in Michigan City. Due to discussions between the contractor and Marina operators, it was decided to delay the start of the project for one week. There are still many sailboats at the Marina and additional time is needed for them to move, so the project will begin on October 5th instead of September 28th.

Joie Winski, La Porte County Auditor

Auditor Winski discussed the purpose for the upcoming Agenda item regarding the Sheriff's Department overtime. She explained an incident that occurred at the Annex building in the last few weeks. Three men were found in the building after 4:00 p.m. when the Payroll Department and the Chief Deputy Auditor, Andrea Smith, were working. Auditor Winski met with Sheriff Boyd and it was decided that a Deputy or Jailer would act as security at the Annex Building.

Hearing or seeing no additional Department Heads, President Yagelski closed Department Head reports.

LIAISON REPORTS

Councilman Garner agreed with Auditor Winski regarding the security at the Annex and how the County's assets are going to be secured.

Councilman Novak attended the Veterans' Court Graduation and said it was very moving and touching.

Councilman Santana had nothing to report.

Councilman Kirkham announced the upcoming Park and Animal Shelter meetings.

Councilwoman Sosinski said two of her departments are on the Agenda for later in the meeting.

Councilman Bernacchi attended some Workshops with the Finance Committee where salaries were reviewed. He also said that 973 appeals were filed with the Assessor in 2015, with 878 Residential and 95 Commercial/Industrial appeals.

President Yagelski said he attended the AIC Conference in Michigan City and said it was well attended. He said many attendees expressed what a beautiful area it was and how they would come back to spend a weekend. He also acknowledged the AIC Conference Committee for doing such a great job and working so hard.

President Yagelski discussed his appointment to the Interim Study Committee on Courts and the Judiciary in Indianapolis. He said the 4th and final meeting will be October 20th.

Lastly, President Yagelski reported on NICTD and Positive Train Control. He explained that Congress forced this upon NICTD and the original proposal that was thought to be \$40,000,000.00 was actually \$140,000,000.00. It will have to be spent, but Congress had decided not to help. Chicago has decided to shut down on January 1st and the NICTD vote will be October 2nd. President Yagelski anticipates the vote will be the same as Chicago and the ball will be back in Congress' court.

NEW BUSINESS

Michiana Resources Request for Financial Assistance

Bill Trowbridge, President & CEO of Michiana Resources

Mr. Trowbridge said Michiana Resources does not have enough funding to run The Council on Aging. They received a lot of community support and \$50,000 from each of the hospitals, in addition to other funding. They also use Michiana Resources transportation, but the funding is just not quite enough. Also, the Guardianship Program is underfunded. They can receive a grant for that program, but need to acquire a matching grant. At this point, they are short \$32,000.00. There also needs to be additional funding for the transportation. He is asking the County to assist in the funding.

Councilwoman Sosinski questioned why the financial amount was not put as a request on the Agenda.

President Yagelski commented that he believes the hospitals need to contribute more than \$50,000 each. He asked Auditor Winski why an amount wasn't officially put on the request. She explained that it was advertised to come out of RIVERBOAT or WIN-TAX.

Councilwoman Sosinski asked Attorney Biege if the details need to be advertised to the public. Attorney Biege said it was advertised under County Claims and advises that it is not a specific enough explanation for the expenditure. He recommends that it be re-advertised with a specific clarification of the expense.

Mr. Trowbridge explained that the amounts needed are \$32,000 for Guardianship and \$20,000 for Transportation Support.

A Motion was made by Councilman Garner and seconded by Councilwoman Sosinski to approve a future vote for the Council on Aging to receive \$52,000.00. Motion carried 6-1, with President Yagelski voting Nay.

Presentation by UP Development LLC Regarding Plan to Repurpose County Home

Jessica Berzac, Vice President of Development, UP Development, LLC

Prior to Ms. Berzac approaching, Commissioner Kora addressed the Council to summarize the purpose of her presentation. He explained that the number of residents of the County Home has decreased to only 8. Also, the funding continues to decrease. He continued that modern facilities are needed to attract additional people to the County Home. Currently, approximately \$350,000.00 or more is being lost yearly in the County Home. Therefore, how can the County Home building be maintained and preserved without spending taxpayer money? That is why a tax-credit project is being examined in a rational way. Additionally, the property being built will generate property tax for the County. He discussed the future residents and the expectations for the current residents. Having the arrangement with the Swanson Center will assist with proper placement of these residents and, also, having an existing relationship with a local agency will help the County score higher for tax credits. He continued that the County continues to stay the course and lose money, or explore other options.

Ms. Berzac thanked the Council for the patience and passion they have for the County Home. She expressed desire to preserve the heritage of the building. The working title for the project is Pioneer Place. During County Home meetings, it was made clear that preservation of the Home was vital and that instead of a private investment, a public/private partnership was preferred. A Market Assessment was done and after analyzing the needs of the community, it was decided to develop a 50-unit independent, elderly apartment building, entirely rental, with 10 units of which will be for extremely low-income, disabled, veterans and those in severe need. Partnering with Swanson Center will insure the residents will live the best lives possible. The building will be handicapped accessible with an elevator. There will be onsite management and include an area for Swanson Center to provide services to the residents. Also, property taxes will be paid to the County. Approximately \$6,000,000.00 will be invested for the rehab work by UP Development LLC and they will pursue local contracts and labor.

Councilwoman Sosinski asked what area was looked at for housing the elderly. She believed that local facilities were not full at this time. Ms. Berzac replied that the Market Analysis indicated that the need was there. Commissioner Kora added that the Market Analysis addresses the significant need for senior housing established in the report.

Councilman Garner asked if this information was provided to the County Home Advisory Board. Commissioner Kora replied yes.

Councilman Kirkham asked if any other developers were approached. Commissioner Kora explained that an application was developed and this developer was chosen with which to move forward.

Councilman Garner was asked how much acreage was being given. Ms. Berzac said it was approximately 5 acres.

President Yagelski how they will be taxed if the land is leased. Commissioner Kora replied that the building will be taxed. President Yagelski went on to ask how long the partnership will last. President Yagelski asked if the County could opt out after the initial 15 years and Ms. Berzac replied yes.

President Yagelski said an appraisal of the property is necessary, but appreciates the options being explored. However, he asked if a Section 8 program could be implemented. Ms. Berzac said that option is not available. She said they are pursuing IRS Section 42.

Councilman Santana inquired on the amount of the ground lease agreement. Ms. Berzac replied it is a \$1.00 fee. Commissioner Kora explained that the way to make money is not to lose money. Ms. Berzac said the building will be taxed as a for-profit entity.

Councilman Kirkham asked if the Swanson Center is capable of evaluating the residents of the new facility. Commissioner Kora explained that many of them have mental disabilities. Ms. Berzac added that many other partnerships with local agencies are being evaluated.

Councilman Garner expressed distress over giving the building away. Commissioner Kora commented that taxpayer money is not being used, but the vision is being maintained.

Councilwoman Sosinski expressed concern over partnering with a private company and said closing the County Home would also offer an option of not losing money.

Commissioner Kora said that the choices are difficult, but the option presented should be considered. He also offered the ability to tour a similar facility in another county.

President Yagelski asked if a higher lease could be negotiated. Ms. Berzac said that the project is on a very tight financial budget and that would not be possible. President Yagelski also asked to review the rent amounts, but Ms. Berzac that is not available for at least a week. Also, Ms. Berzac said that once the application is submitted, a response should be received within approximately 2 weeks.

Councilman Novak inquired as to who will live in the 10 units. Commissioner Kora said that would be determined at a later date, when the needs of the residents are evaluated. Councilman Novak also asked if the \$60,000 was negotiable. Ms. Berzac explained that one of the resources offered by the Swanson Center is to insure that the residents are receiving their appropriate entitlements, and the more they receive, the less the County has to contribute.

Councilman Santana asked for clarification regarding the County's commitment to the project. Commissioner Kora explained that the County's commitment to subsidize the 10 units is for 15 years. However, the ground lease commitment is for 99 years.

Councilman Kirkham inquired as to why an Indiana developer is not being used and what will happen to the current County Home employees. Commissioner Kora said employment isn't guaranteed, but the County will do its best to absorb those employees.

President Yagelski asked about Section 42 low-income percentage requirements. Ms. Berzac replied it is 40%. President Yagelski also asked if this proposal is similar to the Rumley Hotel in La Porte. Ms. Berzac said it an excellent example of taking a rundown historic building and renovating it to become a successful place in the community.

President Yagelski acknowledged the students in the audience from La Porte High School from Mr. Mrozinski's and Ms. Kuta's classes.

La Porte County IT Department

Requesting an Additional Appropriation from RIVERBOAT (1191), CCD (1138), WIN TAX (4220) OR CAGIT (1110) for County Telephone System Upgrade	NOT TO EXCEED \$375,000.00
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Ms. Darlene Hale and Mr. Jerry Cooley explained that the leasing option was dismissed, as it would cost an additional \$40,000. Mr. Cooley added that there were many additional services included.

Councilman Garner commented that the last time a phone system was purchased, it quickly went out of date. Ms. Hale explained this system is based on software that includes 5 years of upgrades at no additional charge. Automated Data will provide the maintenance locally.

Councilman Bernacchi asked that since such a large amount of money is being requested, is it necessary to have an RFQ? Auditor Winski replied that because it is software and can be taken from the CCD fund, an RFQ is not necessary. Also, the vendor is on the state list and a state statute allows for special purchases.

Councilman Santana asked how much money is currently in CCD. Auditor Winski replied \$1,359,375.00.

A Motion was made by Councilman Garner and seconded by Councilman Kirkham to approve not to exceed \$375,000.00 for the County Telephone System Upgrade out of CCD (1138).

Councilwoman Sosinski asked about not always being able to access voicemails when she calls. Ms. Hale said on the current system, the voicemails were limited but on the new system, everyone will have that option.

Motion carried 6-1, with Councilman Bernacchi voting Nay.

La Porte County Small Animal Shelter

Requesting an Additional Appropriation from 1129 (COUNTY OPTION DOG TAX) to 1000 (GENERAL) for Overtime/Part-Time Help	\$8,000.00
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A Motion to approve was made by Councilman Novak and seconded by Councilman Garner to approve. Motion carried 7-0.

La Porte County Sheriff's Department

Requesting an Additional Appropriation
from RIVERBOAT (1191), WIN TAX (4220), OR CAGIT (1110)
for Sheriff's Department Overtime \$2,500.00
for Jail/Sheriff Security \$30,000.00

Sheriff Boyd clarified that the \$2,500.00 is overtime for the garage and the \$30,000 is overtime for Courthouse Security.

A Motion was made by Councilman Garner and seconded by Councilman Bernacchi to approve both items out of CAGIT (1110). Motion carried 7-0.

La Porte County Clerk

for Superior Court No. 3 Clerk's Desks & Chairs \$4,021.35

Councilman Bernacchi asked if there were any discretionary funds that could be used. Ms. Lynne Spevak replied that they are looking into legislation on the perpetuation funds. She continued that fixed assets, such as computers and software can be purchased, but not the desks and chairs.

A Motion to approve was made by Councilwoman Sosinski and seconded by Councilman Bernacchi to approve out of RIVERBOAT (1191). Motion carried 7-0.

La Porte County Recorder

A Motion was made by Councilman Garner and seconded by Councilman Kirkham to approve out of RIVERBOAT (1191). Motion carried 7-0.

La Porte County Highway Engineer

Requesting an Additional Appropriation
from RIVERBOAT (1191) WIN TAX (4220) OR CAGIT (1110)
for ADA Bathrooms \$110,000.00

Mr. Mike Yacullo explained that the original architect's estimate was \$205,000.00, but after receiving the bids, he said the restrooms in the building could be made ADA compliant with approximately \$110,000.00. If the \$205,000.00 is considered, bathrooms in other buildings could also be made compliant. The \$110,000.00 would be construction costs.

Councilman Garner asked if any engineering was paid for on this project. Mr. Yacullo replied that \$5,000 was paid to Larson-Danielson.

Councilman Novak asked if this would make the building ADA compliant or just the restrooms. Mr. Yacullo said the restrooms, as Mr. Cooley is taking care of the smaller ADA compliance issues in the building.

Mr. Cooley said the water fountains in the building are ADA compliant.

A Motion was made by Councilman Novak and seconded by Councilman Garner to approve \$205,000.00.

Councilwoman Sosinski asked about the \$110,000.00 versus the \$205,000.00. Mr. Cooley explained the \$110,000.00 would be to only to make the bathrooms in this building ADA compliant.

Councilman Novak asked why it was advertised at \$205,000.00. Mr. Yacullo replied that was the architect's original estimate.

Councilman Bernacchi clarified that Larson-Danielson was hired for engineering and the contracting was put out to bid. He inquired as to who was the low bidder.

Mr. Yacullo replied that hasn't yet been determined, but it is between Larson-Danielson and Tonn and Blank.

Councilman Novak withdrew his Motion. A Motion was made by Councilman Novak and seconded by Councilman Garner to approve \$110,000.00 out of RIVERBOAT (1191).

President Yagelski suggested that the men's urinals be waterless. Mr. Cooley said that the County uses a lot of water, so he would be interested in more information.

Motion carried 7-0.

Mr. Yacullo said only one bid was received for just under \$100,000.00 but with the 10% contingency, the requested amount is \$110,000.00. Mr. Cooley commented on the status of the roof and said the water pools on it and it has saturated the concrete.

President Yagelski said the life of the roof should have been included in Ameresco's study. Mr. Cooley added that much was cut and President Yagelski said it was because at the time, the County did not have the money.

A Motion was made by Councilwoman Sosinski and seconded by Councilman Santana to approve out of RIVERBOAT (1191). Motion carries 7-0.

La Porte County Maintenance

Requesting an Additional Appropriation

for Maintenance Hazardous Clean Up

\$11,000.00

Mr. Cooley distributed information to the Council members. He said the information on the cleanup came from ServPro and that there is a terrible odor in that area. President Yagelski said that pigeon droppings do not constitute hazardous material. He said the area is located just above where the Sheriff cars exit the building.

A Motion was made by Councilwoman Sosinski and seconded by Councilman Santana to approve out of RIVERBOAT (1191). Motion carried 7-0.

La Porte County Maintenance

Requesting an Additional Appropriation
from 1191 (RIVERBOAT) WIN TAX (4220) OR CAGIT (1110)
for Maintenance Demolition \$20,000.00

Mr. Cooley said this is the building behind the old Work Release building. He said it is starting to collapse toward the sidewalk.

President Yagelski asked why the Highway Department can't demolish it. Mr. Cooley said it was because it is next to the power station and it presents a liability issue. He said one bid was received, but it was put out for bid.

President Yagelski suggested it goes back to out for bid.

A Motion was made by Councilman Bernacchi and seconded by Councilman Santana to table. Motion carried 7-0.

La Porte County Maintenance

Requesting an Additional Appropriation
from 1191 (RIVERBOAT) WIN TAX (4220) OR CAGIT (1110)
for Maintenance Purchase of Plow Truck & Plow \$37,000.00

Mr. Cooley said the vehicle is in poor condition and rusted. He said it takes approximately 8 to 10 weeks after ordering the truck, so he is concerned because the snow season is approaching.

Councilman Novak suggested waiting until the Commissioner's proposal for leasing vehicles is presented before purchasing this vehicle.

A Motion was made by Councilman Novak and seconded by Councilman Bernacchi to table. Motion carried 6-1, with Councilwoman Sosinski voting Nay.

La Porte County Commissioners

Requesting an Additional Appropriation

for Commissioners' Liability Claims \$350,000.00

Auditor Winski explained that the request is because the liability claims exceeded the \$1,000,000.00 allocated at the beginning of the year. Attorney Shaw Friedman said the claims were processed as they would typically be, but each year is different and some will be higher or lower than others.

Auditor Winski described some of the liability issues, including vehicle and property damage claims.

Councilman Bernacchi asked if the amount could be decreased, but Auditor Winski replied that it is a hard number. Attorney Friedman added that it is not one large claim, but a combination of many small claims.

Councilman Kirkham asked if there were pothole claims, but Auditor Winski replied there were actually more mailbox claims.

A Motion was made by Councilman Garner and seconded by Councilman Bernacchi to approve out of RIVERBOAT (1191). Motion carried 7-0.

La Porte County EMS

Requesting an Additional Appropriation
from RIVERBOAT (1191) OR WIN TAX (4220)
for EMS Cardiac Monitors

NOT TO EXCEED
\$400,000.00

Mr. Andrew McGuire explained that this went out to bid over the last month and one bid was received from Physio Control. He said the project has been discussed for the last three years and the current monitors are at end of life and parts are no longer being made for them. A grant was applied for, but it was rejected.

President Yagelski requested the exact bid price. Mr. McGuire replied it was \$381,540.52.

Councilman Novak asked for the life expectancy of the monitors. EMS responded that it is approximately 15 years and that a comprehensive maintenance contract is included.

A Motion was made by Councilman Bernacchi and seconded by Councilman Santana to approve \$381,540.52 out of RIVERBOAT (1191). Motion carried 7-0.

La Porte County Haz-Mat

Requesting an Additional Appropriation
from RIVERBOAT (1191), CCD (1138), WIN TAX (4220) OR CAGIT (1110)
for Haz-Mat Vehicle Purchase

\$65,000.00

After discussion between Jeff Hamilton and the members of the Council about the price of the vehicle, the additional add-on items and whether or not this vehicle could be included in the vehicle lease proposal being developed by the Commissioners, it was decided to table the request to see if the price can be reduced.

A Motion was made by Councilman Kirkham and seconded by Councilman Novak to table. Motion carried 7-0.

COUNTY COUNCIL/ATTORNEY COMMENTS

Councilman Garner questioned why the Coroner has not put stickers on his vehicle, even though it has been requested for the last 5 to 6 years.

Councilwoman Sosinski said that since she is the Liaison, she spoke to Mr. Sullivan said he was going to Mr. Cooley's office to get the stickers applied.

It was discussed to take his car or not fund his requested Budget. Attorney Biege said any adjustments to the budget need to be addressed at the next Budget Hearing.

Councilman Bernacchi asked whether that was dependent on him applying the stickers. Councilman Garner replied yes.

Attorney Friedman asked that the Commissioners be allowed to make the request to Mr. Sullivan before the vehicle is parked.

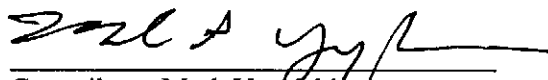
