**La Porte County Commissioners' Meeting Minutes**  
**Wednesday, May 6, 2026 at 10:00 a.m. County Complex Room 3**

**President Steve Holifield** called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m. followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Rita Layton, wife of Ken Layton/former Deputy Auditor and Jim Menne, former Principal/Teacher, were both remembered with a moment of silence.

**Auditor Mike Rosenbaum** called the roll: **Commissioner Steve Holifield** - Present; **Commissioner Joe Haney** - Present and **Commissioner Connie Gramarossa** - Present. Quorum present therefore meeting commenced.

Considered the agenda. **Commissioner Haney** motioned to approve. **Commissioner Gramarossa** seconded. Motion carried 3-0.

Considered approval of the April 15, 2026 minutes. **Commissioner Haney** motioned to approve. **Commissioner Gramarossa** seconded. Motion carried 3-0.

**Auditor Mike Rosenbaum** read the Claims with Payroll ending 4/17/2026 - \$1,530,550.80. **Commissioner Haney** motioned to approve payroll. **Commissioner Gramarossa** seconded. Motion carried 3-0.

**Auditor Mike Rosenbaum** read the Operating Expense Claims - \$1,858,534.23. **Commissioner Haney** motioned to approve operating claims. **Commissioner Gramarossa** seconded. Motion carried 3-0.

**Public Comment**

**Gautama Logwood**, 104 W. Greenlawn Drive, La Porte, Elections do have consequences, lost his race yesterday to an opponent that no one has heard of in the first two weeks of early voting because of crossover from Labor Union. Came today to see through to the end of the Data Center Ordinance that he has worked so hard to get passed. No doubt with the election outcome that the ordinance probably won't pass today and will get sent back to plan and languish again. Doesn't think the general public is in favor of Data Centers, thinks they want protection for zoning and farmland but with no driver, it will fail. It's in God's hands now, thank you.

**Doug Newland**, 2992 N. 300 E., Rolling Prairie, echoed that elections have consequences, the citizens of La Porte are paying attention, they have to like what you're doing. One seat in particular four years ago was very much well supported by the general public and that individual lost the bid for reelection, people are watching. 'I think you two gentlemen, you have two more years plus the rest of this year, seven and a half months. My personal opinion here is, and I'm probably not alone, I think the two of you should be making the decisions moving forward for the rest of this year. After January, you're going to have a third person and then everything changes up but this year, I think you two gentlemen should make the rest of the decisions that affect La Porte County, its citizens, anything that goes forward from here as President and Vice President and also boards' - **Commissioner Gramarossa**, actually I'm Vice President. **Doug Newland**, that can be changed. **Attorney DiMartino**, Mr. Newland, this is a three-person board so everybody's opinion has to be taken into consideration but they get your point. **Doug Newland**, thank you for listening.

**Gary Radtke**, Radtke Engineering and Surveying, 5821 N. US 35, La Porte, presented a letter to the Commission regarding the surveying issues that have been discussed in the county. Has been a surveyor for 35 years, opened his office on Highway 35, 21 years ago, most of the issues discussed have been due to unknown surveying companies, this is unprofessional and it does not represent the surveying profession as a whole. Local surveying companies do not do that, this is the first time they have heard anything like this in our county. We welcome our clients and the neighbors to talk to the surveying crew while they are working in the field, this could lead to additional work for them. The submitted letter includes the state statute that gives permission to trespass with conditions such as identifying themselves. Boundary surveys costs between \$1,500 to \$5,000 a survey. In order to get section corners, at times we have to survey over a mile away. Former Surveyor Tony Hendricks had located a lot of the section corners but not all of them in our county. Sometimes there is asphalt on top of the section corners so we have to excavate a bit of the asphalt to get to the section corners for accuracy. If this happens again where citizens see trespassers on their property, they should immediately call the police.

**Tim Shortt**, lifelong resident of La Porte County, Wills Township. On behalf of the Department of Indiana Marine Corps League Toys for Tots coordinator, presented the Commission with a certificate of support. In 2025, 16,413 toys were collected in the 6-week time period for about 200 collection boxes that were out, the most boxes we've had which did include Knox and North Liberty. Toys were distributed to 5,400 La Porte County children. Indiana had 10 Marine Corps League detachments that collected 105,700 toys that were distributed to a little over 30,000 kids throughout the State of Indiana. Nationwide, 234 Marine Corps League detachments collected 4,298,000 toys that were given out to 1,400,000 children, including Native American children living on reservations out west, children living in Homeless Shelters, Foster Care, basically any child in need receives a toy from the Marine Corps. The group also distributed about 400,000 books that were collected during the six-week campaign. As for the Military Order of Devil Dogs, each year a check is donated to a local children's hospital where their National Convention is located and in August of 2025, a \$100,000 check was donated to the Cook Children's Hospital in Dallas for equipment. They also donate a check every year for a local non-kill animal shelter and \$10,000 was donated to Operation Kindness in Dallas as well. This year in August in Indianapolis at the Windham by the airport, the National Convention will be held so that means the checks will go to Indianapolis for 2026 year. **Commissioners** thanked Tim for the work that the Marines do.

**Eric Beal**, 307 W. 13<sup>th</sup> Street, La Porte, quoted Lyndi Stone, principal corporate counsel at Microsoft, who was speaking at a webinar hosted by the law firm Norton Rose Fulbright less than six months ago, 'Nobody really wants a Data Center in their backyard. I don't want a Data Center in my backyard. Data Centers, once they are operational don't bring a lot of jobs. They do on a construction side, but not really getting a ton of that community benefit from having a Data Center truly in your backyard. Government officials, who are elected by their community, certainly want to make their constituents happy, and you, in turn, have to make your constituents happy so that you can still get your permit and you can still operate there.' This is from a lawyer that works for Microsoft telling people the reality of it, someone who has inside information and saying she does not want this in her backyard. We have to lobby, bribe local governments until they agree with us. Microsoft is just here to sell us a dream. Recognizes the work that the Commission is doing. Microsoft will be here Tuesday, the 16<sup>th</sup>, to do a zoning board meeting and get more land. We have to get ahead of it. Begged the Commissioners to continue to work hard to get this stuff out of our community. Offered a photo of a sign displayed about the meeting. **President Holifield** requested Eric to stay after the meeting to see the photo of the sign, not sure if it is Microsoft or a solar company out to destroy America with bribery and stuff. **Eric** replied the name Microsoft is right on the sign.

**Deborah Bell**, 125 South Avenue, La Porte, has been following the Data Center fiasco, disappointed with both the State of Indiana and City of La Porte's government is doing to our town, our county and cities in Indiana. Lot of stuff done 'under the table,' underhanded, done in secret, NDAs signed. Erin Brockovich is now following this, you remember her, there are cities suing their governments, recalls on elections, everyone has had it with this – the Data Centers are not in her backyard but they are close. Knows they are not in Tom Dermody's backyard. This will affect our water tables, ground temperatures, sound level. According to research, she will not be allowed to sit on the back patio and have family over without hearing the constant hum from the Data Centers. Prays La Porte County really thinks about this before overly cooperating with the City of La Porte, guardrails are off for La Porte, they aren't listening, not sure what can be done other than a recall or sue, our property values are going to tank, quality of life will be awful, utility costs will go up even more, no one cares about us at all. Lifelong La Porte resident, family is here, does not want to move. Hope the Commission protects the County and not roll over, play dead for the City of La Porte, think it through, do research. Think it through before you sign anything with La Porte City because they do not care about the County, only in it for themselves, they're letting the City of La Porte fall apart before our very eyes and does not want to see that happen to the County as well.

**David Losciuto**, 501 Walker Street, Michigan City, would like to have Rodney McCormick either relieved of duty or reprimanded from the alcohol bureau for conduct unbecoming of appointed official in La Porte, that's all he has.

**Gary Metcalf**, 4205 N. 325 W., La Porte, few things from the last couple of meetings, still pushing for NDAs to have no bearing and any official should be able to sign them, as a County it could be put in writing that if you sign an NDA, you be relieved of your political duties on that specific day of signing. Next is what he caught as a 'bribe.' Why would a Solar company donate \$100,000 to the Fairgrounds when they don't even own property in La Porte County as of today. Calls that a bribe and that should not be included anywhere in any government. Does see a Solar company attempting to get a special exemption, might be the same company. Solar does have possibilities, adequate at best, not a complete solution by itself, still believes solar should be in an industrial park. It takes up a lot of room but should not be on a farm or anywhere near a farm. Might qualify as light industrial versus heavy industrial, could boost what we have at KIP. The biggest drawback for selling/promoting KIP is the power grid, not enough power to run anything heavy industrial. Moved on to the deal with the City, we have yet to see in writing, as a bystander or concerned community, that actual contract saying what taxable money the County is going to get, wasn't sure how that Board decided who should sit in that committee meeting with the City (La Porte) and we need to pay real close attention to be sure it is followed strictly and Tom doesn't back out at the last minute, he's been known to wad up contracts and throw them away after he gets what he wants. You've worked 8-10 months on this ordinance, thinks it needs to go, be signed, be put in. An ordinance is a live contract, it can be changed, modified, updated anytime. You need to push to be sure it gets signed, today, if possible, you can do a first/second reading, it's not perfect. He is concerned for the ditches that the County is responsible for, and the waterways. Concerned that dewatering from Microsoft has to go somewhere and it cannot just sit. Millions of gallons of water to be sent down the County's ditches, County needs protection and maybe TIF what's touching the city limits as of today.

### Department Head Comments

**Matt Reardon**, Economic Development, brought to the Commissioners' attention property at 144 Dogwood Drive, La Porte, a bit of a clouded title, drainage problems in this particular subdivision. Adam Walz, owns 144 Dogwood Drive, came to the Commissioners' office looking for help related to riparian rights for docks, a sliver of property has changed titles several times, which is strange for this parcel, it is an orphan parcel and unbuildable, it is clear the intent for the parcel was meant for a drainage easement, there has been a public infrastructure that has been put down there at the bottom of this area. The landowner is proposing the following to mitigate this issue; riparian rights need to be protected, there are docks and some things that are there that do not belong to him nor his neighbor therefore they need to be removed. At his expense, 144 Dogwood owner would engage services of a registered engineer with a background in hydrology to do a drainage analysis, the accompanying engineering design to put in a catch basin for not only water quality protection but flood protection. Requested from the Commissioners to allow this property owner to proceed forward with engaging an engineering design firm to work with the MS4 Coordinator and County Highway to not only remove what is there now that doesn't belong to either neighbor out of the way, but then to review what's being submitted to make sure it is in concert with the DNR requirements but also the County to pay for it then turn the land back over, once that is done for the County to record a drainage easement so this doesn't happen again. **President Holifield** suggested the information be given to our County Attorney. **Matt Reardon** replied he has given Attorney DiMartino the info. A clear survey has been provided by Adam Walz. **Commissioner Gramarossa motioned to approve the request. Commissioner Haney seconded for discussion.** He went onsite on Friday; there is a drain there at the end of the road, it appears that's what it is for, looked at various documents going back over the decades, century, definitely interesting language in there held over from prior days gone by. One of his thoughts after seeing it is do we notify the neighboring property owners? **Matt Reardon**, they *are* the adjacent property owners. Title is a bit clouded but with the updated survey to file a drainage easement over the top of it. **Attorney DiMartino**, the motion is going to give the property owner the ability to do a survey, get approval from MS4 and the Drainage Board, once that is done, come back and we can get that easement placed. Highway will be included. **Commissioner Gramarossa**, is this parcel titled to anyone? **Matt Reardon**, at one point it went back to Maude Johnson, in the 90's it was deeded to Al Stevens, it was voided by Bard Dreiner and then back to Maude Johnson. It is an orphan parcel which really serves as a drainage easement. **Commissioner Gramarossa**, how is Allen Stevens' name tied into this, I don't understand? **Matt Reardon**, according to the records, it was Quit Claim deeded, he was in part of the deed search. In the 70's it was Whites, Wurtlin, Ballard, Reaves and now Walz. Possibly back in the day no one thought to record a drainage easement. **President Holifield**, we've got this issue in a lot of lakefront communities. **Motion carried 3-0.**

**Mike Rosenbaum**, Auditor, shared that the State Board of Accounts is starting their audit of our 2025 year, because we are switching to a GAAP year, Generally Accepting Accounting Principles, that information won't be available until later in the year but they are now auditing what they call our Grants, the process is starting before we walked over here. We did get caught up this year and this is the best way for us to get our credit rating back so we are working on that, we are two pieces of information short but we will have it to them by Friday. We have a company that reviews our pension, there's a footnote that you need an actuary to put together so they promised we would have it by Friday. Baker Tilly was hired to help us with financial statements and we are waiting on that as well.

**Joe Haney, Commissioner**, there is a certain level of decorum that we, or at least he believes the Board expects to be upheld from our appointed positions to various Boards, he feels that level of decorum here on County property, during and out here in the hallway in reference to other citizens just unfortunately isn't being met so, **he motioned to remove Rodney McCormick from the Alcohol Beverage Commission. Commissioner Gramarossa seconded for discussion**, a lot of people come to our meetings, folks are appointed to positions, we have *employees* who have come here and not displayed good behavior. We have not fired those employees, we don't remove those candidates, and it has always been that everyone has the right to express their views and opinions so if we start removing people from Boards, we have employees who are doing things not upstanding, are we going to start firing those employees? **President Holifield**, in 16 months I've never had an employee come before this microphone and act like Mr. McCormick did, I witnessed the last one after our Commissioners' meeting, talked to someone after the Election Board meeting who had to be escorted to his vehicle because he feared. Mr. McCormick has gotten out of hand multiple times and he thinks it's time he takes the punishment for it. **Commissioner Haney**, he does not undertake such a move lightly, but when an individual threatens multiple members of the public with physical bodily harm, there are police reports filed and then law enforcement has had to show up a couple of times in a row, that's just behavior that we're not able to condone. **Commissioner Gramarossa**, we've had employees come to this podium and scream liar! liar! We've gone through a lot these last 8 years or so, you're making an accusation that there were police reports that wasn't shared with this Board, for me to make a decision based on what you're saying when earlier today, you made a claim yet when I called the individual, they did not say what you were saying they said. She is not privy to the police report and everything else so she will recuse herself from the vote. If you all have information that you have not shared with her, she will not vote on it. **Commissioner Haney**, appreciates that and for the public's edification, if he were to witness any employees or other appointees threatening physical harm to other members of the public or other individuals either here in this room or out in the hall as he has Mr. McCormick then he would be doing the same thing to remove that individual or some type of sanctions so we haven't had that... **Commissioner Gramarossa**, we have the Sheriff in the room, have him come up and tell us whether this person was arrested or anything. **Attorney DiMartino**, thinks it was the City of La Porte that was here. **President Holifield**, it was the City because he witnessed it and gave a statement to the officer, it is still under investigation. **Motion carried 2-0. Commissioner Gramarossa recused herself from the vote.**

### Requests

**Considered** 60 sick days pay to Connie Trojanowski who is retiring from the Sheriff's Department. **Ron Heeg**, Sheriff, Connie is a long-dedicated employee of the County with 48 years in the Sheriff's office, no additional funds are required, they have the money. **Commissioner Gramarossa motioned to approve. Commissioner Haney seconded. Motion carried 3-0.**

**Considered** travel for EMA to Dowagiac, Michigan for training. **Rob Sabie**, Director, submitted information to the Commission. **Commissioner Haney motioned to approve. Commissioner Gramarossa seconded. Motion carried 3-0.**

**Considered** barrier replacement between Juvenile Service Center & Community Corrections. **Commissioner Joe Haney**, Maintenance Department pieced the fence back together which stands between the buildings of Community Corrections and Juvenile Service Center. Obtained 3 quotes, **Commissioner Haney motioned to approve moving forward with the lowest bid of \$15,000 for a wooden barrier with Northwest Indiana Fence Co. Commissioner Gramarossa seconded**, are we now approving contracts here in the Commissioners' meeting for the Maintenance Department? **President Holifield**, no, this is from JSC and Community Corrections, Miss Davis said they would take care of it themselves. **Commissioner Gramarossa**, again, so shouldn't they be here making the...? **Attorney DiMartino**, JSC went ahead and got the bids, they did not go through the Maintenance Department, if they did not go through the Maintenance Department then they can come directly to you. **Commissioner Haney**, they solicited quotes, the maintenance department *was* involved though, Angie was at our meetings as well as Reed. **Attorney DiMartino**, but JSC and Community Corrections did the work? **President Holifield**, yes. **Commissioner Gramarossa**, so the actual recommendation then is just for us to pass it on to the Council, not to approve the contract? **President Holifield**, I understood the information, we have a motion and a second, any more discussion? **Both Commissioner Haney and Gramarossa**, no. **Motion carried 3-0.**

**Considered** 250<sup>th</sup> Celebration Committee's request for funding/donation source & decorations. **Commissioner Haney**, himself, Councilman Koronka, Bruce Johnson, both Director and Assistant Director Angie Davis and Reed Smith all met, immense help from Matt Reardon who secured donations, we are a little over halfway in our donation marks but we will need to proceed, which would cover one of the things I think we covered last time we talked about briefly, one concern we had about the cost of doing the 27 individual flags, from 13 stars, 15, all the way to the current 50, was that those are kind of spendy, if we could secure enough donations then it would be worth it, so far the money that has been committed covers those flags but now we need funding for the bunting and other décor for the Courthouse. Requested moving forward with the project, up to \$10,000, \$6,000 of which we have acquired and continue to try and move forward to get the rest of that, believes we will, but if we do not then we will approach the Council for the remainder of the \$10,000 mark. This will be for quality items to utilize every year going forward to celebrate Independence Day. **Commissioner Haney motioned to approve moving forward for the project. Commissioner Gramarossa seconded. Motion carried 3-0.**

### New Business

**Considered** Property/Casualty/Workers' Comp annual renewal for Insurance. **Stacy Green and Kar Nallenweg**, Michiana Insurance. This year, our carriers remained the same for most lines as we have seen not only positive customer service but positive claim service as well. I did request quotes from Travelers, our property and liability carrier, for the auto physical damage and liability as well. While the premium is a bit less, the deductibles are much higher, and our auto liability would go from a \$0 deductible to a \$500,000 SIR. Based on our pattern of reported claims, we would end up paying more than our current premium in the long run. In addition, GIE has been a great partner offering resources such as the driver's training class to potentially reduce claims, along with great claims service. Regarding the workers compensation, we have been pleased with Key Risk as we have worked alongside them implementing a return-to-work program which has had a positive impact on rate. I am pleased to report that the experience modification rating decreased from 1.48% to 1.43%, however, we saw a small increase in premium due to payroll increases. This year, Travelers continued to exclude 809 State Street from the property schedule, discontinuing property coverage due to over \$11.7 million dollars in claim payout since 2022. They have noticed our continued progress on the building; however, they are not yet ready to yet offer coverage. On the positive, CRC Group offered premium decreases in premium for both layers this year. As for our Travelers package, we did see a small increase in premium, however, we did increase our inland marine schedule significantly after a comprehensive review with each department head. We added coverage for the new Highway Hanna shed, a gazebo at the Small Animal Shelter and an updated value for the new Farm Bureau cabin at the Fairgrounds replacing the existing unit. Overall, we are seeing a small increase for the entire package at just over 5%, which in today's market is very good. **Commissioner Haney motioned to approve the renewal with the \$1,000 deductible with GIE, keeping Layer 1 with 809 State Street and adding Layer 2 for Terrorism for \$7,137. Commissioner Gramarossa seconded. Attorney Guy DiMartino has reviewed everything and recommends the approval. Motion carried 3-0.**

**Considered BZA Appointment. President Steve Holifield**, once again trying to do what the citizens want, we have to replace someone and as we did last year the Plan Commission, last one on is the first one off which in his opinion would be Brad Mrozinski and recommended Tony Oss be the replacement from the Plan Commission. **Commissioner Haney motioned to replace Brad Mrozinski with Tony Oss, following President Holifield's reasoning that the most recent appointment should be the first one to get replaced. Attorney Guy DiMartino**, suggested removing Brad Mrozinski first then make the appointment. **Commissioner Haney motioned to remove Brad Mrozinski from the BZA Board. Commissioner Connie Gramarossa seconded. Motion carried 3-0. Commissioner Haney motioned to appoint Tony Oss to the BZA. Commissioner Gramarossa motioned to appoint John Carr to the BZA. Discussion took place. Commissioner Gramarossa**, Tony works for Larson-Danielson and she understands that he said he will recuse himself but he is also voting on different zoning, ordinances and other cases coming in, believes that is a conflict of interest. He is married to a Judge and at times, cases go to the courts and often times they recuse themselves from the cases then it goes to the next court, court to court. As for John Carr, it was stated he works for the union and that is a conflict, he is currently retired, is not with the union so therefore has no conflict of interest. Wants the public to know the truth. **Auditor Mike Rosenbaum called the vote: Commissioner Haney - Tony Oss; Commissioner Holifield - Tony Oss and Commissioner Gramarossa - John Carr, to avoid lawsuits. Tony Oss will now be on the Board of Zoning Appeals.**

**Considered Plan Commission's recommendation for Data Center Ordinance. Attorney Guy DiMartino**, this is a Plan Commission ordinance, not Board of Commissioners, and the Commissioners' role is you have three choices: Accept, Reject or Send back with additional work to be done. The ordinance provided does have a number of typos and he is willing to go over them for the record. **President Holifield**, briefly, yes. **Attorney Guy DiMartino**, first page, 4<sup>th</sup> 'whereas,' (assuming) sitting should be sighting, bottom of the first page, definition of data center should read, 'data center uses include but are not limited to data storage facilities.' Page 2, paragraph 3 B, paragraph 6, after 'substations,' there's an 'and,' that's not substantive. Page 4, #2 says, 'showing that illumination levels will not exceed property lines,' that will need to be edited, don't know if they're talking about the lighting does not ex – go past the property line so there's a question mark as to that; under #4, maximum sound levels, for A and B, it's just going to say the time, it's going to be Central Standard or Central Daylight will be added on to that as to the times, depending upon what time of the year. #4 – 4, last line should read 'the property line, the operator shall immediately implement mitigation.' On page 5, small 6, emergency and first responder training, 'data center operators must offer annual training sessions, too,' and you're going to add 'volunteer' fire departments. Just clarifying that in our County, our fire services are volunteer. Small 6, paren 4, clarifying that the County will read 'La Porte County,' and next to the last sentence, 'special equipment or reimburse La Porte County for the purchase. No real substantive changes, just clarifying changes and then there's some semi-colons to be added and things like that but paragraph, periods, but nothing substantive, you can accept, reject or send it back. **Commissioner Haney motioned to accept the Data Center Ordinance with edits as presented. Commissioner Gramarossa seconded** then confirmed that it is just typo errors. **Attorney DiMartino**, yes. **President Holifield**, next week the Data Center committee is getting back together to go over this living document which can be amended, changed in the future and there will be other guidelines with anybody coming before us, they'll have to go to the BZA for approval and everything else. The use of warehouses is covered under the Joint Zoning Ordinance, JZO. This is only the second Data Center Ordinance in the State, he's got a list of Commissioners in his office that are wanting to see this once it is approved, other counties will start looking at these along with other projects coming in, especially green energy projects that really don't do any substantial benefit to anybody. **Commissioner Haney**, glad we have something in front of us here that we're voting on, positive first step to have something on the books, looking forward to additional recommendations from the Plan Commission to tighten this up in the future but the importance of getting this on the books today before any Data Centers file any petitions with us today, the rules go the date the petition is filed is what rules are on the books. A few of these things, such as lighting, which has been an issue for folks, our current JZO has restrictions for businesses and commercial buildings as far as shielding for your light so that they're not already shooting up into sky and shielding to keep the direct lumens on the property itself and not going over property lines so there's some protections there, obviously, strengthening those protections is good but that's what that's referencing to in that '4' that we read earlier, and again, it can be tightened up further but we have an ordinance already on the books for lighting that flows over so I'm happy we're getting something here on the books directly related to this today and looking forward to more in the future. **Commissioner Gramarossa**, this is something great and we do have KIP out in the County, we really need to move all these Data Centers, if they're going to happen in the County, they should really happen in KIP, several discussions have taken place. There's a place for them, they just have to be put in the right spot, this is not something we want next to someone's home. **Motion carried 3-0.**

**Auditor Rosenbaum**, before you adjourn, there was an earlier discussion about your next meeting, if there's going to be any discussion about it. **President Holifield**, not today yet, I've got to check the calendars.

**Commissioner Haney motioned to adjourn at 11:14 a.m. Commissioner Gramarossa seconded. Motion carried 3-0.**
